	 Questions and Answers (CG): Once students complete the program through the MNEA, is the intention for them to gain employment at one of the 6 partnership member organisations? (DH): Yes – although the organisations do not guarantee employment, they do participate in the program with this in mind. The intention is at least for the students to be employed locally and remain local. (GH): What qualifications do the students receive upon completion of the program through the MNEA? (DH): It could be anything ranging from engineers, electricians, automotive etc (AWS): Is there a leadership component to the MNEA program? (DH): Yes – the employers buy into this; the students learn leadership and entrepreneurial skills on site. Each student has a mentor from one of the organisations. (GH): Are there no girls currently in the MNEA program? (DH): No. There are not many girls studying engineering or manufacturing at the moment. (CM): Is it explained to the students at school that some companies have a zero alcohol tolerance policy? 	
	(YC): Yes, but a lot of the students don't care – we don't know why.

	(GC): With regard to the bulk of the population being located outside major service centres, where are these major service centres? (YC): They include Clare, Port Pirie, Kadina, Barossa etc. We don't have a large TAFE Campus in our vicinity – the Clare Campus offers limited training. The next nearest TAFE is 100km from Clare.	
	(AWS): Why is Agriculture not included in the Community Top Priorities List? (YC): It was not identified in the last round of research undertaken by Regional Development Australia in 2011, however we agree it's an important future skill and we're looking at a similar academy model for agriculture.	
	(JF): Agriculture is a definite skill requirement. Most schools have Agricultural Science courses. (YC): Not all schools offer those courses. There is a huge gap.	
	(YC): We have recently taken over the lease of a shed owned by the Clare Valley New Life Church and have gained support both financially through a \$45k grant from the Office for Youth and in kind to develop an Independent Learning and Training Space ideally located across the road from Clare High School to develop as a training centre. Through project based learning opportunities this project aims to link young people with local business and industry to enable them to participate in hands on learning in a real life work environment whilst at the same time develop independent living skills. The issue is how we get the students there. We go and pick them up but we only have one people mover. We need a strategy for a sustainable model to transport the young people. We offer fuel vouchers but the students can't always get here to pick them up as they either don't have a car that is currently registered, roadworthy or the fuel to get to the training. We would like to form partnerships with likeminded organisations that would be willing to assist. We also need a learning space for girls – the shed is more useful for the boys. Is the CLG a suitable platform for those who want to form partnerships? We have had discussions with small business but we really need a starting point.	
	(JF): As the MNEA was a pilot, do all local businesses know about the program? (DH): Promotion to likely businesses has been undertaken but the executive committee wanted to limit exposure for now as just developing.	
	(JF): Is the MNEA program also funded by the 6 Partnership Members? (DH): If a company becomes a member, there is a sliding scale of membership fees, depending on the size of the workforce. The training component itself is funded by the State Government.	
	(GH): Is the course work through the Mid North Engineering Academy a 2 year course? (DH): Yes we are 6 months into the 2 year program with the current students and the next intake of students will occur in 2013.

	(GH): So an agriculture oriented programme is being looked at? (DH): Yes – we've been speaking with various stakeholders and some ideas are crystallising. This will be a cross regional initiative (Barossa, Yorke and Mid North) and the partnership is currently being formed and the scope and concept drafted.	
	(CN): If you are looking for businesses to partner with, there is one in Clare called Productive Nutrition that deals with the food that cows eat – it's quite scientific but they can't find qualified people to employ.	
	(CN): Perhaps if a similar model was looked at for automotive, then those who have cars could bring them in and assist with the transportation? (YC): Yes – we just need to be cautious about duty of care.	
	(CM): Couldn't a school bus take kids directly from school to the training? (YC): Potentially, but some of the students may have been 'exited' from school so it wouldn't work for them. Buses also need to be back at school at a designated time to do the afternoon run and this leaves a small window of time in some instances. (CN): That's why we need to get access to the kids early.	
	(CP): Could we leverage Councils? (YC): Local Government recently purchased a fleet of cars and a minibus to assist with transporting people to Clare and Adelaide – however these are mostly used for the aged community for health reasons so there is little room for young people to use these services.	
	(AWS): Could the sessions be run at night-time instead? (YC): Potentially – but we don't run a lot of training courses in the evening as it can be difficult to engage with youth at that time of the day.	
	(CN): School students and school leavers need to be educated about money. They often don't get taught about it at school. It's important to teach them young so they take responsibility for themselves as they get older. I would be happy to assist with this.

	 Civil remediation work has begun on site by a local mid north contractor (value of approximately \$1.5M) Work includes: Hydro mulching Native species re-seeding Upgrading drainage solutions Minor improvements to batters and roads TRUenergy is currently working through the legal and privacy issues related to the release of completed Noise Monitoring Results from neighbouring residences where complaints have been registered. 3.2	Stony Gap Wind Farm Update	
	 EPBC Referral Minor clarifications sought and provided on Referral does not affect the Local Government Development Assessment process Development Application All Submissions to the Stony Gap DA have been received and a detailed response has been issued to Regional Council of Goyder (RCG). RCG has sought a peer review of the Noise Impact Assessment. TRUenergy supports RCG in their efforts to provide a fully transparent process. Comments received 4th June 2012. A Development Application decision is provided post Development Assessment Panel hearing – likely to be late June/July. 	
3.3	Waterloo 2 Wind Farm Update	
	 Two recent Community Information Days have been held based on consultation with the CLG: Clare had 10 visitors and Marrabel had more than 40 visitors. All Technical Studies have been received in draft and all studies show compliance with statutory guidelines and planning policies. Although no sensitive vegetation will be cleared and no threatened species have been identified, an EPBC referral will be made to the Federal Minister in coming weeks. Any minor vegetation clearance will be covered through a Native Vegetation Council application and payment. Landholder agreements are in place. Development Application likely to be submitted to Clare and Gilbert Valleys Council in the coming months. Development Application and associated technical studies will appear on TRUenergy website upon submission to Clare & Gilbert Valleys Council.

3.4	Robertstown Wind Farm Update	
	 Assessment of our Development Application for an extension to the current permit for the Wind Monitoring mast at Robertstown will be assessed by the Regional Council of Goyder DAP in line with the Stony Gap DA hearing at council's request. Landowner liaison is ongoing with interested and follow up correspondence is planned with involved parties who have recent concerns. The site is still undergoing feasibility and is a second order priority at present. 	
3.5	Questions and Answers	
	 (JF): Will those who have requested noise monitoring results get them and when? Legally they must if they're residents. (CP): Noise testing results are provided to private landholders on whose property testing is conducted. Landholders are also given access to our independent noise monitoring experts to receive a verbal summary of their results and ask questions. Detailed results are not made available to the general public to protect privacy of individual landholders and given that findings are specific to one geographic location. However we are happy to provide an explanation of the results from our compliance testing to this group given their interest in wind farm noise. (JF): I recently had a meeting with Michael Head which went really well. There are still 	
	unresolved issues, but it was good to communicate.	
	(CN): With regard to the accident on site – do your workplace systems and strategies cover incidents like this?	
	(CP): Yes. There is a full investigation pending and all work was stopped on site when the incident occurred. We have a comprehensive Health and Safety Management System in place and we treat these incidents very seriously.	
	(CN): Does Michael Head handle these incidents for Waterloo?	
	(CP): Yes he does. The person involved in this instance was a contractor and was caused by user error.	
	(HH) With regard to DENR, they are undergoing some internal changes at the moment which may be causing the delay in communications regarding the potential bird strike matter.	
	(CP): We did meet with the MD of DENR to discuss and we are keen to understand the results of the post mortem. We undertook an investigation of the area but there was no evidence of a bird strike.	
	(JF): Is DENR the same as the Department of Environment and Heritage? (CP): Yes.	
	(JF): There was a bird strike some time ago and it took a while to get the results of the post mortem.

FOR CONSIDERATION BY CLG MEMBERS

1. Protocol for managing unannounced observers

In the circumstance that a person turns up at a CLG Meeting unannounced, the protocol is:

- Georgina House to initially invite the unannounced person to wait in the front room of Gally's
- Georgina to ask the person for their name, interest and group they represent (where applicable)
- Georgina to introduce herself and explain the:
 - Purpose of the CLG (Terms of Reference)
 - Nomination process for joining the CLG
 - Group Charter
- Georgina to indicate to the person that she will put their unannounced request to attend the CLG Meeting to the CLG Members at the beginning of the meeting and seek the consensus of the CLG Members in relation to the request
- Georgina will request the unannounced people to wait in the front room or outside
- Georgina to open CLG Meeting and discuss the request with members

Note: The Terms of Reference request that attendees have:

- A clear interest in or connection to TRUenergy Waterloo and Stony Gap wind energy projects
- Community groups, organisations or stakeholder groups with more than one person interested in attending are encouraged to nominate a representative
- If the consensus of the CLG Members is to invite the unannounced person then that person will be invited to join the meeting in an observer role and the Group Charter will be explained
- If the consensus of the CLG Members is to not invite the unannounced person then Georgina will inform the person and email the minutes of the meeting to them once ratified.

2. Protocol for handling questions and comments from observers

The following protocol for handling questions from observers is suggested:

- Confirm the role of observer is to observe during meetings
- Provide opportunity for questions to be lodged with Georgina House in advance of the meeting, or provide questions without notice to Georgina House at the commencement of the meeting
- Depending on the number of agenda items and time commitments, provide opportunity for observers to ask questions at a nominated time towards the end of the meeting.

3. Protocol for managing media

The CLG is not a forum that is suitable for media participation. In the circumstance that media turn up at a CLG Meeting unannounced, the protocol is:

• Refer media to Sarah Stent, Corporate and Government Affairs, TRUenergy's Communication who will arrange an alternative time to talk with media.
